Greater Bendigo's Food System Strategy guides the actions of organisations and groups working to strengthen and support Greater Bendigo's food system from 2020-2030.

Greater Bendigo's food system is healthy, equitable and sustainable and supports the local economy, culture and health and wellbeing of our communities.

- A healthy food system that promotes the health of people and enhances the natural environment
- An equitable food system that makes nutritious and culturally appropriate food accessible and affordable to everyone across our communities
- A sustainable food system that strengthens our local economy and builds the capacity and resilience of our communities

- 2. Strengthen and support a sustainable local food economy that enables the growth, production and sale of healthy food locally

Greater Bendigo's Food System Strategy (the Strategy) was adopted in June 2020 and this report outlines progress on actions for the first year of the Strategy's implementation.

It's been a challenging year with lockdowns, restrictions and associated impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. These impacts have had a significant influence on the food system, contributing to an increase in people seeking emergency food relief, disruptions to supply chains and difficulty recruiting a seasonal harvest workforce.

Despite this there has been great progress made on the actions of the Strategy with work progressing on ninety-three of the Strategy's actions.

Throughout 2021 the City has also been undertaking Imagine Greater Bendigo, an initiative to consult the community on their vision for the future of Greater Bendigo. Information from this process is being used to inform a number of plans and strategies the City is developing including:

- Greater Bendigo Council Plan (Mir Wimbul) 2021-2025
- Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan 2021-2025
- Climate Change and Environment Strategy (2021-2026)

These plans and strategies will align with the Food System Strategy and likewise information from Imagine Greater Bendigo will be used to help guide the future direction of the Food System Strategy.

The UNESCO City and Region of Gastronomy work has also continued to progress over the past twelve months including:

- Hosting the Djakitj Larr event, bringing together community, creative industry and food system stakeholders to discuss the future of gastronomy and the food system in the region
- Launching the Gastronomy Guide and Producer Directory
- Completing stage one of work with the Dja
 Dja Wurrung on how to develop the Six
 Seasons concept, resulting in a report with
 recommendations for how the City could work
 with DJAARA to incorporate the Six Seasons into
 events, projects and more
- Stakeholder engagement and development of new branding for City and Region of Gastronomy products and services, to be launched in the 2021/2022 financial year
- Working with DFAT and Australian High Commission in Malaysia on the Australia Now Malaysia campaign, which included showcasing Bendigo and the region on a new SBS cooking show hosted by Adam Liaw

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Objective 1: Enable communities to access safe, affordable, nutritious and culturally appropriate food and drinks

Food system partners undertook a wide range of work to enable communities to access safe, affordable, nutritious and culturally appropriate food and drinks. Despite and in response to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic our partners rose to the occasion to help our community.

Sharing the Active Living Census

Healthy Greater Bendigo and Healthy Heart of Victoria developed a video to support community understanding of the Active Living Census and encourage use of this data to advocate for funding. A mapping project is also underway to support a clearer spatial understanding of health and wellbeing issues and needs across the municipality.

Healthy Sports Rewards

The City received funding from VicHealth to implement the healthy sports rewards project, providing vouchers to sporting clubs from local sport and recreation facilities to reduce fast-food rewards in junior sport. Ten clubs from eight different sports participated over the 2021 winter sport season and the program will continue over the summer season.

Multicultural Nutrition Projects

Bendigo Community Health Services works with groups of refugee background to build health literacy. As part of these programs a Karen Healthy Eating Guide was developed in Bendigo that was culturally safe and easily understood. They facilitated a partnership with Diabetes Victoria and Bendigo Karen community members to develop the first Karen Healthy Eating Guide. The community consultations and food styling were all conducted in Bendigo by Bendigo Community Health Services staff, Bendigo Community Health Services bicultural workers of lived experience and Diabetes Victoria staff. The Guide was piloted to ensure the content was culturally safe and easily understood. Content experts Diabetes Victoria ensured the Karen Healthy Eating content were referenced and accurate. Bendigo Community Health Services bicultural staff have also been trained and have delivered healthy eating sessions to Karen, South Sudanese and Afghan people.

Healthy Food Basket study

The City hosted two Monash University Master of Nutrition & Dietetics students for their work based public health nutrition placement in February-March 2021. The students used the ASAP tool and Store Scout app to undertake an assessment of supermarket environments across the municipality. These tools assisted the students to investigate the cost and affordability of a healthy basket of food and examine the marketing and promotion practices of stores. This study will be repeated in future to track affordability and marketing within supermarkets across Greater Bendigo.

COVID-19 Response

Equitable and reliable access to safe, affordable, nutritious and culturally appropriate food and drinks became a much more visible issue as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Loss of income, restrictions on the distance able to be travelled from home, panic buying, and supply

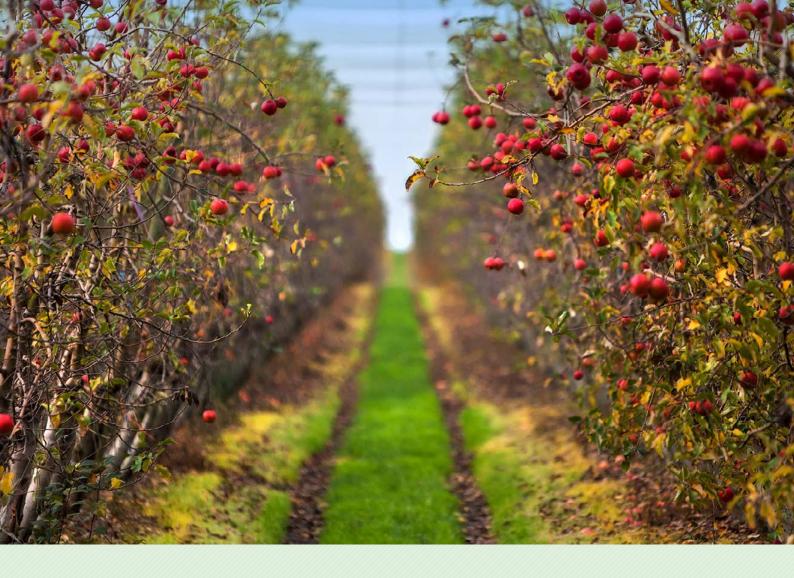
chain issues all effected the community's access to food and contributed to a rise in food insecurity.

In response to this the Bendigo Community Farmers Market responded quickly to increase their market frequency to have a weekly market every Thursday to assist the community to have regular access to local fresh produce.

Bendigo Foodshare and the local emergency food sector also mobilised quickly and worked with a wide range of partners to be able to provide meals and groceries to those in need. Some of the innovative initiatives implemented to allow this to happen include the Bendigo Food Pantry website, Cafes for Covid, and providing recipe cards with hampers to assist recipients to utilise ingredients in their hamper.

Objective 2: Strengthen and support a sustainable local food economy that enables the growth, production and sale of healthy food locally

Many of the actions under Objective 2 are longer term projects that will require progress across a number of years. Some great ground work has been happening to plan and get started on these projects over the past year. Some projects of note are highlighted below.

Climate Change and Environment Strategy

The City has been working hard on developing the next iteration of the Climate Change and Environment Strategy for 2021-2026. The strategy includes sustainable food system targets and actions for the City and for community. Food systems have also been included in several flagship projects that will be undertaken to progress many of the strategy's actions.

Regional Gastronomy Guide

The Regional Gastronomy Guide was launched in March 2021 and showcases leading local producers, venues, experiences and trails across Greater Bendigo. The interactive map allows tourists and locals alike to explore all the region has to offer. The Guide will be expanded to include the whole region of gastronomy and additional businesses added.

City and Region of Gastronomy Branding

Stakeholder engagement was undertaken for new branding to promote City and Region of Gastronomy products and services. The new suite of branding is now under development and will be launched in the 2021/2022 financial year.

Good Living Pack

The Bendigo Visitor Centre have developed the 'Good Living Pack' that contains healthy, local food and drink items from across the region. The hamper retails for \$45.95.

Objective 3: Support local food growing and producing, sourcing, cooking and sharing knowledge, skills and culture

Not all that has come from COVID-19 pandemic restrictions and lockdowns has been negative. One positive that has come from people spending more time at home is an increased interest in growing food². Community feedback from the Imagine Greater Bendigo process and Djakitj Larr event also revealed the important role the community sees for school and community gardens. Several projects are underway to help our community to grow, source, cook and share food knowledge, skills and culture.

Community and School Gardens

The City, Healthy Greater Bendigo and Kalianna School hosted the Sowing the Seeds to Success event at PepperGreen Farm in March 2021. This event brought together community members who are involved in or interested in school and community gardening to learn, share knowledge and network. Guest speakers from the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Foundation, Bendigo Foodshare, the City, Coliban Water, Marong Neighbourhood House, Violet Street Primary School, Kalianna School, spoke about the many ways to get involved in school and community gardens and resources available to assist gardens.

This event also offered an opportunity to launch the Bendigo Community Garden Network and the City's community garden info hub. The event was funded as part of the Health is Everybody's Business -Leadership Activation Project funded by a VicHealth Reimagining Health Grant.

Bendigo Foodshare - YouFoods Project

Bendigo Foodshare undertook youth food insecurity research in 2020, the first research of its kind conducted in Central Victoria. Insights from this research have been used to inform the YouFoods Project to tackle youth food insecurity, break barriers, grow knowledge and skills and uphold dignity.

The project works with and supports local youth organisations, agencies and schools to build awareness about food relief information and services, increase engagement with Bendigo Foodshare, help simplify access to food and develop strategies to create resilience amongst this demographic.

Some of the key outcomes of this project so far include providing assistance to three schools and a community house to develop their Cooking Clubs, connecting with schools to improve food security amongst disengaged youth, linking local schools with the Grow a Row project to grow and share more food.



Healthy Heart of Victoria - Schools Kitchen **Garden Project**

The Healthy Heart of Victoria Schools Kitchen Garden Project was a six-month project, concluding in December 2020. Seven primary schools and two early learning centres participated in the project with each education setting identifying how this initiative could support an increase in growing food and healthy eating activities within their school or centre. Participating schools and centres were supported with education sessions and funding for infrastructure and resources. Healthy Heart of Victoria and the City will continue to support schools and early learning centres to incorporate food education into their curriculum.

Gravel Hill Community Garden

Fresh produce shortages from supermarkets for emergency relief occurred occasionally due to COVID-19. When this happened excess produce from the Gravel Hill Community Garden was able to be harvested to include in emergency food relief parcels and the food pantry. Excess produce from the community garden was also made into meals that were frozen and distributed for food relief.

Objective 4: Reduce and divert food waste from landfill

Significant progress has been made to reduce and divert food waste from landfill in the past 12 months. This has largely been due to the expansion of the City's Organics collection and an increase in food rescue by Bendigo Foodshare.

Organics waste

The City has expanded its household organics collection to include Heathcote, Elmore, Axedale and Goornong and continues to offer the Compost Revolution program in all other rural areas and townships. The City's organics collection is also being expanded to provide services to schools and local businesses.

Organic materials collected through this service are converted to Biomix compost which is used by the City in its parks and gardens. The compost is also available for school and community gardens that have participated in the City's waste education sessions.

The Resource Recovery team are also trialling community compost days to re-distribute compost back into the Greater Bendigo community, hosting two community compost distribution events in Bendigo in the 2020/2021 financial year. This program will be expanded to other townships in the 2021/2022 financial year.

Eight centres (who provide food) had their menus assessed and approved by the Healthy Eating Advisory Service.
 - Further, as part of the program Centres are required to deliver "learning experiences" for children and parents/ caregivers on the three key messages: eat well, clean well and drink well. Of the engaged centres all have water policies. Water is readily accessible for children at these centres. Centres undertake a range of learning experiences for "eat well": growing fruits/vegetables, cooking classes, education sessions targeted at healthy eating (sometimes food, dietary guidelines etc).
 - Of the 35 Early Learning Centres currently enrolled in Smiles4Miles, 21 have received approval of their Healthy Eating and Oral Health Policy.
