

# POSTCODE 3556 - EAGLEHAWK & DISTRICT COMMUNITY PLAN

## 1. Welcome

Community members are best placed to plan for the future of their own communities. Identifying a vision, then planning for actions to realise the vision is a great mechanism to develop partnerships and gain support from key stakeholders to bring that vision to life.

## 2. Background to the Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk District Community Plan

The development of the Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk and District Community Plan continues the commitment for small townships and local communities to establish a future vision for their local areas. The Community Plan has been prepared by the Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk District and Community Enterprise after extensive consultation with the community and focuses on the community infrastructure, development and social needs to keep pace with the current and future demands of a growing, diverse and developing area.

The Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk and District Community Plan has been developed to identify the areas inherent strengths and core values.

### *Our Strengths*

- Plenty of off street free parking in the retail precinct
- Wide open spaces including streets, from the Eaglehawk Town Hall to Avery's Road.

## 3. Vision

Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk and District Community Plan vision is:

*The area is a diverse, dynamic and inclusive community with a commitment to retaining its distinct local identity*

The core values from the Plan are:

*Community spirit, participation and investment for the future.*

## 4. History of the Postcode 3556 area.

### **The Story of Eaglehawk**

Gold was first discovered in Bendigo in October 1851. The gold rush came to Eaglehawk in 1852 when a group of gold seekers found a nugget while searching for a stray horse. Legend has it that an 'eaglehawk' flying near the claim inspired the towns name<sup>1</sup>.

Alluvial gold was largely exhausted by 1853. Following this, quartz mining continued for almost one hundred years. Three hundred tonnes of gold were

ultimately extracted from Eaglehawk. Commonly known localities were named according to the dozens of gold and quartz mines established on hills (Virginia Hill) and in gullies (Sailors Gully, Job's Gully).

The first sale of land facing High Street took place on the 20th and 21st September 1854. By 1855 the population had reached 20,000. Declared an independent borough in 1862, Eaglehawk developed into a self-sufficient working class town with a range of industries and factories sustaining the local community.

In 1880, the Eaglehawk Borough had a population of 7500, the ratepayers numbered nearly 800 and the town, four miles from Bendigo, had its own Town Hall, money order office and telegraph office. Its hills and gullies included numerous hotels; two state schools, and eleven churches as well as three banks. The Library of the Mechanics Institute had over 1500 books for loan. In Canterbury Park, the people of Eaglehawk had open space formed and laid out with flowerbeds and shrubs.<sup>2</sup>

Some fine buildings were constructed in Eaglehawk in the nineteenth century, however it was essentially a working class area where the majority of houses were simple miners cottages. In 1888, Eaglehawk boasted forty-one hotels.<sup>3</sup>

In June 1890, the first trams ran between Sandhurst (Bendigo) and Eaglehawk, however Eaglehawk had already developed a separate and independent character. This sense of separate identity was well illustrated at the Borough Council meeting of 6th May 1874 when it was proposed to erect a tollgate at the entrance to Eaglehawk from Bendigo.<sup>2</sup>

The continued existence of mining landscapes and mullock heaps provides a link with Eaglehawk's foundations in gold mining. However, a rugged bush landscape has also survived and Eaglehawk is now in close proximity to nature reserves and parks of state and national significance.

Today, Eaglehawk is an urban village whose residents express pride in its ability to meet local needs. A strong sense of the township's history and its 19th century architectural legacy underpin the town's identity. Upon amalgamation of the Borough of Eaglehawk with other neighbouring Councils to form the City of Greater Bendigo in 1994, the community expressed fears of disenfranchisement, and were concerned that loss of the independent Borough status would lead to the town's decline. The citizens of Eaglehawk have expressed concern that Eaglehawk is considered a 'less desirable place to live' by residents from other areas, nevertheless the residents of Eaglehawk are proud of being from 'the Borough' and keen to promote its assets.

The town's vibrancy is demonstrated daily, in the busy retail centre, thriving industrial estate and dynamic school cultures. Indeed, the town's annual "Dahlia and Arts Festival" is highly successful as a result of an active local committee and patronage from locals and visitors alike. The operation of the Star Cinema in the

historic Eaglehawk Town Hall draws visitors to Eaglehawk, and also provides activity in the town centre at nights and on weekends. It is a reminder of past days when the Eaglehawk Town Hall was the centre of cultural activity.

Since Eaglehawk's gold era heyday, many changes have occurred to make way for progress. Changes such as removal of tram infrastructure, demolition of original verandahs, and replacement of bluestone and brick kerbing with concrete kerb and channel have all altered the appearance of Eaglehawk. Concerns that Eaglehawk's character and heritage places could still be lost were frequently raised in the plan's consultation process.

Today it is understood that a balance between old and new is required. The need to keep, protect and conserve things from the past must be balanced by an appreciation that the needs and wants of the community have changed and that sensitive new development should also be allowed.

### **The Story of California Gully**

California Gully is usually regarded as that small township that one passes through between Long Gully and Eaglehawk – just another part of Bendigo's urban sprawl. But California Gully has a fabulous past. Gold was found here in 1852 at the same time that it was discovered in Eaglehawk, a few months after the initial gold find at Bendigo. It is presumed that California Gully is named after miners who came from California and worked in the gully searching for alluvial gold.

In the 1850s both California Gully and Eaglehawk became established townships. Eaglehawk became a centre of local government when it was created a Municipality in 1862, then a Borough in 1863. A town hall was built in Eaglehawk, and banks opened there, making Eaglehawk the central area of the Borough of Eaglehawk. California Gully, part of the borough, continued to look after its locals, having all facilities except a bank.

As surface or alluvial gold became scarce, reef mining developed to get gold from the underground quartz. The mines were to here to stay and the shopping centres became permanent. Gold mining was the mainstay of California Gully, Eaglehawk, Sailors Gully and indeed the Bendigo area.

Over the years the California Gully community has weathered depressions, the decline in goldmining, the deprivations of war years, and little housing development as people moved to the newer suburbs which didn't have those great grey dusty sand heaps.

In the 1960s much land was opened up for housing bringing a slow but steady increase of new families to the area. The housing boom of the late 1990s and the first few years of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century has changed the face of the old California Gully landscape. Mining waste lands of grey slum sand, mullock and bull-rushes are giving way to new streets and houses.<sup>4</sup>

## **The Story of Long Gully**

The area of Long Gully was well known for alluvial mining and later quartz reef mining and had the heaviest concentration of deep quartz mines and shafts on the Bendigo field.

Long Gully with its dominant church buildings, its small miners cottages and its mixture of larger buildings and remnant commercial land uses reflect the identity of the scattered mining hamlets of the nineteenth century.

In 1862 Long Gully was included in the Borough of Sandhurst. In the mid nineteenth century businesses (blacksmith, butcher, drapers and engineers) and hotels were established in the area and as roads became an issue in 1877 this was a mark of urbanisation for the area. In 1865 the Long Gully Methodist Church was constructed and further signalled urban growth along with gas main connection to the area in 1866. The Mechanic's Institute was built in 1878.

It became apparent that civilisation to the area was becoming abundant so Long Gully received one of the new government schools in 1873.<sup>5</sup>

## **5. Aim of this Process**

The Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk and District Community Plan Working Group has undertaken surveys and a community workshop to discover and document the community vision and the actions needed to achieve this vision for the future of the Postcode 3556 community.

- Survey/Workshops - A survey of both residents and students was conducted as well as two community workshops to gain feedback from locals about their aspirations and ideas for the future development of Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk District.
- Priority Identification - The Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk District Community Enterprise Group used the community workshop feedback to identify the top priorities.

The aim of this document is to provide the whole community the opportunity to participate and share in the development and ownership of a vision for the future of Postcode 3556.

The Community Plan represents the future needs and wishes established through workshops and wide consultation.

The survey information and community feedback from the workshops were collated and clustered into the following themes:

1. Health and Wellbeing / Community Resilience / Support Services
2. Education and Training

3. Sport and Recreation / Public Building and Open Spaces
4. Entertainment, Arts and Culture
5. Industrial/Commercial/Shopping/Retail/Jobs
6. Transport and Movement
7. Township Appearance and Structure
8. Natural Environment / Sustainability, Water and Climate Change

These themes will provide the key considerations of how Postcode 3556 will grow and develop.

The 3556 Working Group will provide the on-going governance to progress the initiatives of the Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk and District Community Plan and will call upon community members to take part on sub-committees to progress the initiatives.

The Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk and District Community Plan will be governed by the 3556 Working Group and the plan will be continually updated and reviewed every 2 years by the Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk and District community to ensure on-going relevance.

We have an outstanding number of volunteers in Postcode 3556 Eaglehawk and District and together we can make this plan become a reality.

## 6. Demographic Profile for Postcode 3556

The Population and demographic are based on the 2006 Australian Bureau Statistics (ABS) Community Census.

### PERSON CHARACTERISTICS

According to the 2006 Australia Bureau of Statistic Census undertaken in 2006 10,338 people lived in the postcode 3556 area. Of this 47.5% were males and 52.5% females with 1.8% people having a indigenous or Torres Strait Islander background. This is compared to 48.3%, 51.7% and 1.1% respectively for the City of Greater Bendigo.

## 8. Where to from here?

These sub-committees will be the most important component of ensuring this Community Plan achieves the objectives and actions outlined.
