Have you checked out the redeveloped Ewing Park yet? Well, do yourself a favour and visit soon because there really is something for everyone!

If you're looking for a place to take the family for a fun day out, a place to exercise outdoors, go skating, cycling, running, walking, or a place to relax, enjoy and watch the world go by, then Ewing Park is definitely the destination for you.

Over the past few years, Ewing Park has undergone a major \$4.97M transformation into a multipurpose community and sporting precinct that provides many recreation opportunities for people of all ages, cultures and abilities who want to spend time at a great park or who want to be more active.

The \$1.6M first stage of the project was completed in 2020. This stage included construction of a new oval with irrigation system, AFL-standard LED competition lights and a dual lane, synthetic walking/running track and picket fence around the perimeter of the oval.

The recently completed \$3.37M second stage has included:

- District-level skate park complete with mini bowl, ledges, quarter pipe, flat bar eurogap, down rail, hubbas and stairs, along with a shade shelter, seating and drinking fountain
- Learn-to-ride park and playspace featuring a roundabout, pedestrian crossings, speed humps, different surfaces to practice on, natural and built play equipment, shade and seating
- Cycling trail hub shelter with repair station

- Parkland areas with walking paths, barbecue facilities, seating, drinking fountain, landscaping and tree planting
- Toilet block with accessible, unisex cubicles
- Bouldering/climbing wall and rebound wall
- · Outdoor fitness equipment
- · Picnic/viewing area and seating zones
- New car parks in Havlin Street West and Harcourt Street



Eppalock Ward's Cr Margaret O'Rourke said the City of Greater Bendigo, in partnership with the Victorian Government, had made a significant investment in Ewing Park.

"Ewing Park is bordered by Brougham Street, Williamson Street, Harcourt Street and Havlin Street West, and is home to the United Cricket Club, Sandhurst Junior Football Club and St Therese's Junior Football Club," Cr O'Rourke said.

"It's within walking distance to the city centre and is easily accessed from the popular Bendigo Back Creek Walking and Cycling Trail, making it very accessible off-road for many residents if they use the existing connecting cycling and walking trails.

"There are now so many great things for people of all ages and abilities to enjoy at the park, and I think it will become a much-loved destination for both residents and visitors for many years to come.

"When people discover Ewing Park and all that it offers, I'm sure they will return again and again."

The \$4.97M redevelopment has been a partnership project funded by the Victorian Government (\$2.89M) and the City (\$2.08M). **gb**

Originally called the Williamson Street Reserve, Ewing Park was renamed in 1926 after former Bendigo Mayor, William Ewing, in recognition of his service to the city.

Mr Ewing served as a councillor from 1920 to 1928 and was Mayor in 1925. He passed away aged 72 in 1948 at his Williamson Street home.

Crusoe Res this summer!

Crusoe Reservoir is one of Greater Bendigo's best-kept secrets that you need to discover this summer.

Set in an area of 210 hectares surrounded by the Greater Bendigo National Park, Crusoe Reservoir is a terrific destination for swimming, non-powered boating, cycling, walking, jogging, fishing and bird watching.

The area is dominated by box ironbark forest ecology and when you visit, you'll see many examples of revegetation and habitat restoration works, such as frog ponds, storm water harvesting, nest box installations and native grass lawns.

A great place to cool off with a swim, Crusoe Reservoir features a wooden platform on the shoreline and an island pontoon further out in the water with ladders and plenty of space to dive from or just relax on.

If boating is your thing, non-powered boats, canoes, kayaks and sailboats are all permitted on the reservoir.

Or if you are a keen angler, it's a great spot to fish for native species with plenty of space along the dam wall and around the shoreline to set up a camp chair and settle in for a few hours of fishing.

For those who enjoy a walk or cycle, there is a 3.3km scenic circuit walk around the reservoir where you can enjoy a mixture of bushland and water views. The gravel track is wide, well-formed and accessible by walkers, cyclists, prams and wheelchairs. You can also walk across to the nearby No 7 Reservoir via a 1.7km walking track, which connects the two areas.

Grab a group of friends and head to Crusoe Reservoir this summer! gb

More people, more often

new plan to transformHargreaves Mall

A goal of three years has been set to transform the Hargreaves Mall and broader city centre, to attract more people, more often.

The new Hargreaves Mall Action Plan 2023-2026 aims to propel business attraction and ensure the city centre, particularly Hargreaves Mall, again becomes a destination of choice for businesses, residents and visitors.

Mayor Cr Andrea Metcalf said a more direct approach was needed to create a more vibrant and inviting city centre.

"Traditionally, the City of Greater Bendigo's role in the context of Hargreaves Mall and the city centre is the maintenance and appearance of public areas. It does not own any shops and has no say on which businesses landlords lease their shops to," Cr Metcalf said.

"However, Council repeatedly hears complaints about the city centre. There is no one 'silver bullet' solution but the adopted plan's multi-pronged approach provides renewed guidance on making improvements.

"Where there are people en-masse shopping, dining out or attending events, we don't see anti-social behaviour occurring. Hargreaves Mall is the perfect space to accommodate lots of people, it has a big screen, the necessary equipment for people to run a PA system or for a band to play, and is blocked off to traffic so people can move around safely.

"Once a road is reintroduced, there is no changing it back. Consistently there are calls to put a road through the Mall but this won't fix the current problems if we don't have the right balance of retail, hospitality and entertainment on offer that sets the city centre up as a destination of choice.

"In three years' time, if there has been no shift in how the city centre presents and after a sustained effort to create positive change, then I expect Council will need to engage with the community about what further action and more permanent change may look like." **gb**


Key features of the plan include:

- Remove pop up park and replace with new landscaped area including shade trees, seating and tables
- Increase cleaning services in Hargreaves Mall
- Increase funding for the activation of public spaces to enable more events to be held to attract people into the city centre
- Engage a specialist Business
 Attraction Broker to identify gaps in the retail and hospitality sector, and then target specific businesses
- Restart a targeted Expression of Interest process for micro tenancy activation of the two repurposed lantern structures in Hargreaves Mall
- Establish formal city centre stakeholder groups to work collaboratively to focus on social issues
- Reconfigure elements of the bus waiting facility in Hargreaves Mall to continue to offer seating but focus the visual connection to Mitchell Street
- Continue to advocate for reinstating three bus stops along Mitchell Street to reduce clustering in a single location

New trees for the Mall

Hargreaves Mall is home to 11 new Cotton Palms, following the removal of the Kauri Pines on the Killians Walk-side.

The Kauri Pines were replaced because they were rootbound and causing damage to the pavement.





New kindergarten for Marong

The City of Greater Bendigo has welcomed \$5.5M in funding from the Victorian Government to deliver a new kindergarten for Marong.

The new kinder will help respond to unmet demand for three and four-yearold kindergarten places in the region by providing a 99-place kinder.

In partnership with the Victorian Government, the City is committed to meeting the demand for kindergarten places in Greater Bendigo.

The new building will be designed using environmentally sustainable building standards and will be fully accessible. It will feature three kinder rooms, two allied health rooms which could be used by maternal and child health and other health services, staff facilities, outdoor play area, kitchen facilities and bathroom amenities.


Plans for the new kindergarten are currently being finalised and construction is planned to start in 2024 for completion in 2025. A service provider to operate the new kinder is expected to be appointed in 2024.

Construction of the kindergarten is stage one of a two-stage project to establish a community hub complex bordered by High, Torrens and Cathcart Streets, Marong. The new kinder will be constructed on the site of the current tennis courts.

Stage two of the project, which is currently unfunded and may take several years to deliver, plans to provide flexible multipurpose buildings and spaces. gb







DOGS TO BE WALKED ON-LEASH FROM JANUARY 2024

From January 1, 2024, Greater Bendigo will become a safer place for pets and people when our municipality changes from an off-leash default to an on-leash default municipality, with new designated areas where dogs can be exercised off-leash.

Greater Bendigo has one of the highest levels of companion animal ownership in Victoria, with more than one third of households currently owning a cat or dog. The change is being introduced following the adoption of the City of Greater Bendigo's Domestic Animal Management Plan 2021-2025.

The change is happening to help keep public areas safe and enjoyable for everyone and every dog. Other municipalities with the same onleash requirements include Geelong, Ballarat, Mildura and Shepparton.

If you and your dog love an off-leash walk, there are still plenty of spaces designated for dogs to have a romp and play off-leash including four fully fenced dog parks as well as the following new designated off-leash areas:

You can exercise your dog off-leash in these areas at any time, except when the spaces have planned bookings for any organised event such as sports or training. Remember to bring your dog's own water and dog poo waste bags to these locations. Also remember these areas are not dog parks and most are not fenced.

All of the City's dog parks are fully fenced, have water for dogs, dog poo waste bags, shaded areas and small dog spaces so smaller dogs can socialise without the big guys if they prefer.

Remember that even when using the fully fenced dog parks and designated off-leash areas, your dog must always remain under your control, which means they must have good recall.

The City received more than 4,500 requests for animal services during the last financial year

In the last financial year, 356 dogs and 895 cats were rehoused and 657 dogs and 170 cats reclaimed by their owners from Bendigo Animal Relief Centre (BARC)



On-leash exercise is still a great way to exercise with your dog and can provide plenty of mental stimulation for them. In fact, on-leash exercise can more quickly build and improve on the bond you have with your dog.

Some great places to walk dogs on-leash include:

Lake Neangar, with its various extensions into Canterbury Park and around Lake Tom Thumb, provides a variety of landscapes and tracks to explore and is great for dogs who love to spend time with their noses on the ground!

The O'Keefe Rail Trail is a great walk or run for those who love the open space and the serenity. This trail is often used by bikes and horse riders, but overall is a great walk for dogs who might find populated walking areas too over-stimulating.

Lake Weeroona is a shorter track but is a bustling place full of people and is a wonderful walk for dogs who love to socialise.

The Bendigo Creek Trail is another trail full of variety and has busy and not-so-busy sections. This is a great trail to walk if you have a dog who needs their confidence boosted in public places.

Residents are also reminded that there are some places where dogs are banned, including the following areas unless permission to allow dogs within these areas has been granted by the City:

- Playing surface of the Queen Elizabeth Oval
- Playing surface of the Tom Flood Sports Centre (including cycling track)
- Playing surface of Epsom Huntly Recreation Reserve AFL No. 1 and Pitch No. 5
- Within the fenced area of the Bendigo Regional Hockey Complex, the Bendigo Regional Tennis Complex and the Bendigo Regional Athletics Complex
- All playspaces or children's play equipment areas including splash parks
- Playing surface of any synthetic sports grounds
- · Crusoe Reservoir and No. 7 Park
- Within the fenced area of any City aquatic facilities
- Within school areas where the City has a current joint use agreement

24-hour cat containment coming in July 2024

Calling all cat owners! From July 1, 2024 a new 24-hour cat curfew will be introduced in Greater Bendigo.

For many years now there has been an order in place in Greater Bendigo that requires cats to be securely confined to their owner's property from sunset to sunrise. However, this will change to 24 hours per day from next July following the adoption of the City's Domestic Animal Management Plan 2021-2025.

This summer is predicted to be a big one for snakes! It's vital to deter snakes from yards to keep pets safe and know what to do if you suspect your pet has been bitten.

The Bendigo Animal Relief Centre (BARC) recommends having phone numbers for both your regular vet and the Central Veterinary Emergency service saved in your mobile phone, on your fridge or near your landline.

You should also ensure your yard is clear of clutter and things that attract snakes by:

- Keeping grass short and removing weeds from gardens
- · Keeping hedges and trees trimmed and off the ground, raking up leaves and removing fallen branches
- Removing pet food from outside to deter vermin, which attract snakes
- Removing water sources such as old containers and buckets
- · Removing materials like metal sheets, wood, pipes and tarps from the ground
- Limiting access for pets to wood and hay sheds and other locations comfortable for snakes

Pets are inquisitive and there is potential for a snake bite to occur if they attempt to interact with a snake. Reduce risks for your pet with training, recall and confinement by:

- Keeping your cat indoors or limiting their outside access within a cat park with a fine
- · Keeping your dog on a leash when on walks in bush and areas with long grass
- Teaching your dog the "wait" or "stop" command if they approach something suspicious (this command is a great way to get their attention if their recall isn't the best when excited by something)

General symptoms of a snake bite for cats and dogs include:

- Trembling, shaking or twitching muscles
- · Drooling and panting
- · Pacing around, acting restless
- Vomiting
- Pale gums
- · Bleeding from nose or mouth
- · Difficulty breathing
- Collapse, then seeming to "act normal"
- · Loss of bladder and bowel control
- Paralysis
- Becoming unconscious

If you suspect your pet has been bitten, act fast and don't waste time searching for information on what to do! It is critical for

- · Remain calm, as this will soothe your pet and minimise their distress and movement
- Contact your vet immediately and follow their advice
- Apply a pressure immobilisation bandage if possible (similar techniques as recommended for people) or a broad pressure bandage over the bite site
- DO NOT use a tourniquet on the area of the bite
- Minimise movement. Carry your pet or use a blanket as a stretcher for bigger pets as movement spreads the
- DO NOT waste time trying to catch or identify the snake, as your veterinarian can use a venom detection test kit to identify the correct antivenom or administer a combination antivenom ab



Protecting our GIOTIOUS TOWN HALL

Bendigo Town Hall is one of our grandest heritage buildings and the City of Greater Bendigo has, over many years, made a significant commitment to restore and undertake regular maintenance works to ensure it continues to be an important public heritage landmark for many years to

Recently the City has undertaken a range of interior renewal works to keep the Bendigo Town Hall in tip top shape.

Lockwood Ward Councillor Rod Fyffe OAM said few Victorian municipalities boast a town hall as impressive as Bendigo Town Hall.

"The recent works have included painting of the main hall, council chamber, entry and foyer areas. Other works include replacement of the carpet in the main hall, and sanding and polishing of the timber parquetry floors in the foyer and entry areas," Cr Fyffe said.

"The Bendigo Town Hall is a building of national significance listed on both the Register of the National Estate and the Victorian Heritage Register, so it's important to undertake regular works to ensure it remains in good condition.

"In 1996, Council committed to a multi-million-dollar staged program to restore the building from the ground up because over the years it had fallen into disrepair.

"While the original restoration was an enormous, labour intensive and costly project, it brought one of our most treasured buildings back to life to become a functional public building able to cater for community events and special occasions.

"Undertaking regular maintenance works ensures it remains a building to be proud of." **gb**

DID YOU KNOW?

The original building was designed by town clerk George Avery Fletcher and constructed in 1859. This was followed by the addition of a Council Chamber in 1866 and a hall for the trading of grain known as the "Corn Exchange" in 1871-1872

In a series of major works between 1878 and 1902, the Bendigo Town Hall was transformed by renowned architect William C Vahland

In 1936 the interior was threatened by a proposal to convert it into a cinema and in the 1950s the majority of the mural panels were painted over

The building narrowly averted demolition in the 1970s

In 1973 the building was unsuccessfully offered for sale to the Public Works Department

In 2005, Vahland's vision of a clock in the clock tower came to fruition thanks to the generosity of the Bendigo Advertiser and the Rotary Club of Bendigo

Weekly organics and fortnightly waste collections to start in February 2024

Greater Bendigo's household kerbside general waste bin collections will change from weekly to fortnightly and kerbside organics bin collections will change from fortnightly to weekly from the week commencing Monday February 5, 2024.

The change will apply to every property and will be a simple swap, which means you will put your general waste bin out fortnightly on the same week as you currently put out your organics bin and your organics bin will go out weekly.

If you are still unsure, you can check when each of your bins are due for collection on the City of Greater Bendigo's website.

The changes are the result of an audit of the City's kerbside bin collections, which showed that local general waste bins contain a significant 31 per cent of food and garden material that should be going into the organics bin and not to landfill.

By making the switch to when the organics and general waste bins are collected, some 7,000 tonnes of organic material will be diverted each year from landfill.

Reducing the amount of organic material in the waste stream is very important because the Eaglehawk Landfill has almost reached capacity, making it necessary for the City to transport all general waste to a landfill outside of Greater Bendigo, which will drive up the costs to dispose of general waste. These costs are passed directly onto ratepayers via the waste charge on your rates notice. Therefore, making this change will help to minimise future cost increases.

In addition, food and garden waste are valuable resources that can be recycled into a high-quality compost for use by farms, parks and gardens. Decomposing food in landfill emits methane, a damaging greenhouse gas, into the atmosphere and contributes to climate change.

The changes are in line with the Victorian Government circular economy policies and plan Recycling Victoria: A new economy, which has set key actions for all Victorian councils to have zero organic material going to landfill by 2030 and 80 per cent of materials currently going to landfill to be diverted to alternative disposal methods by 2030. These targets have also informed the key objectives noted in the City of Greater Bendigo Climate Change and Environment Strategy 2021-2026.

CONSERVING AND RESTORING A HOME WITH HERITAGE SIGNIFICANCE

If you own a property with a heritage overlay, you may be eligible for a grant from the Greater Bendigo Heritage Restoration Fund (GBHRF).

The GBHRF grant is a newly established scheme and is administered by the National Trust of Victoria. The City is among five councils involved in the grant scheme.

The GBHRF grant is suitable for eligible owners who are planning to carry out external conservation works on their property with a heritage overlay with the aim to protect and retain important heritage elements and values of a significant place.

Funding levels are assessed on a caseby-case basis and are generally up to a maximum of 50 per cent of the cost of works.

Grants will not be issued in full until the entire scope of funded works has been completed and the fund's Conservation Architect has undertaken all necessary inspections and approvals.

Gerard Kennedy applied for financial assistance for restoration works at his heritage property in Heathcote where his family runs the Kennedy Vintners cellar door business on the ground floor and their home is on the first floor. The former Commercial Bank of Australia property is recognised for its local historic, architectural and aesthetic significance to the area. Built in 1886, the restoration work was extensive and included repairing the slate roof, replacing gutters, rain heads and downpipes, while the façade needed tuckpointing, rendering works and repainting.

"I've always loved old buildings, so we jumped at the opportunity when we saw this unique building for sale,"
Gerard said.

"But I was concerned about the state of the building. The leaking gutters above the façade were destroying the masonry and tuckpointing. One way or another, we were going to do the work. I felt a commitment to the town to do it right as it is an iconic building on the High Street in Heathcote.

"I didn't know about the financial assistance available through Council until I spoke to a Councillor."

"Because Bendigo has so many great heritage buildings, we were able to get access to local tradies who are used to working on heritage projects. The building looks incredible, and we've had a lot of positive feedback from the community. It is a privilege to conserve a place that has such significance in Heathcote's history."

Heathcote now has a semi-permanent StoryWalk thanks to a partnership between Goldfields Libraries and Healthy Loddon Campaspe. You can find it at the playspace at Barrack Reserve, opposite the library. It's set up all year round and library staff change the stories regularly to keep them fresh.

Kangaroo Flat and Eaglehawk libraries will also join in the fun with StoryWalks at Rotary Park and Canterbury Park throughout January.

Where to go as a last resort when bushfire threatens

Bushfire Places of Last Resort are to be considered a place of last resort in a bushfire emergency. They should only be used if all other plans have failed and should not be considered as places to relocate to when leaving early.

Bushfire Places of Last Resort are a piece of open ground that offer minimum protection against radiant heat and embers. Safety and survival cannot be guaranteed, and support services are not provided to people and their pets.

They are a place of last resort in bushfire emergencies only that may assist people when there is imminent threat of bushfire and they have no plan, or their planned options are not possible.

It is important to develop a plan, understand your risk and stay informed, as having a well-prepared plan to leave early for a more suitable location is a much safer option. On extreme or catastrophic days, it is recommended you leave early in the morning or the night before if you are at risk of a bushfire. gb

Introducing equity impact assessments

The City of Greater Bendigo is changing the way it deliver policies, programs and services. Staff now conduct Equity Impact Assessments (EIA) to ensure policies, programs and services meet the needs of different genders and diverse user groups.

EIAs support the City to step into the shoes of all community users, particularly those who face discrimination or exclusion, to explore what barriers are preventing people from fully participating in and benefiting from our policies, programs and services.

Once those barriers are identified, staff can then work on reducing or removing them

so that everyone is included and everyone benefits.

A recent EIA was conducted as part of the development of a site and infrastructure plan for the Maiden Gully Recreation Reserve, to ensure the reserve will meet the current and future needs of the community.

By undertaking the EIA staff found that women had a preference for lighting along paths in the reserve, while underrepresented groups preferred seating and gathering areas that provided some privacy while remaining in the public space.

Some multicultural users wanted these spaces to allow for family gatherings without affecting other users, while LGBTIQA+ community members wanted a safe space to sit with their partner, and young people saw these spaces as being welcoming and safe for chatting and connecting socially in groups.

The City undertakes community engagement and EIAs for projects that directly and significantly impact the community.

Albert Richardson Reserve

This landscaped park is located at 40 Marong Road and features a memorial to mark the 2009 bushfires that devastated Victoria, including parts of Bendigo. This lovely small park features seating, open lawns, shelter, barbecues, tables and public toilets.

Canterbury Park Gardens

This is the jewel in the crown of the Eaglehawk open space precinct. First proposed in 1870, the garden was set out in 1873 on 'upside down country', a First Nations' reference to the impact of the gold rush mining days. Visit the garden, walk the trails around Lake Neangar and Lake Tom Thumb, see the amphitheatre, jetty and island, and check out the Canterbury Park Oval and sports precinct and the Mulga Bill-themed playspace.

Gateway Park

Take a leisurely walk around the lake in Kangaroo Flat, have a barbecue or a picnic, or just enjoy the local flora and fauna. The Bendigo Creek meanders through the park and adds to the unique natural character of the area. Located right next to the Gurri Wanyarra Wellbeing Centre, Gateway Park is a wonderful outdoor green space to explore.

Rosalind Park and cascades fountain

Rosalind Park boasts one of the best centrally located vantage-points in Bendigo. This sheltered enclave features both exotic and native trees. Why not venture up the 124 steps of the Poppet Head lookout tower for a panoramic view of Bendigo and beyond. Or see the magnificent cascades fountain, a vision brought back from Italy by the 'quartz king' George Lansell and designed by architect William C Vahland. The playspace is part of Camp Hill Primary School but is open to the public on weekends, public and school holidays.

Garden for the Future

Head to the lush greenery and take in the 30,000 climate-resilient plants that are flourishing in the Garden for the Future in White Hills. Located next door, step across the new wetlands at Larni Garingilang where the aquatic plants are settling into their new home. There are plenty of tables and green lawn for your picnic spread.

Bendigo Botanic Gardens

A short stroll from Larni Garingilang is the heritage Bendigo Botanic Gardens in White Hills. These were Bendigo's first public gardens and were included on the Victorian Heritage Register in 2001 due to their historical, architectural, scientific, botanical, aesthetic and social significance. The garden provides a serene setting and plenty of quiet picnic spots.

Kennington Reservoir

An ideal spot for bird-watching, enjoy an easy stroll in Kennington using the pathways around the reservoir and adjacent bushland before finding a picnic table or bench among the gum trees. It's a great place to enjoy nature and relax by the shore.

Bendigo Creek

Experience Bendigo's unique heritage, history and attractions along Bendigo Creek. There are many sites along the creek where you can have a picnic and enjoy some bird-watching. A good way to see the creek is via the Bendigo Creek Trail for walkers and cyclists. The trail traces its course north-east from Crusoe Reservoir, past natural bush and historic landmarks, all the way to Bendigo Pottery in Epsom. Take a picnic and enjoy a great stopover on the way.

Young families can enjoy recreation, nature and opportunities that are sure to keep energetic children entertained. You can enjoy the award-winning Eaglehawk playspace or the Crook Street playspace in Strathdale, or try out the Lake Weeroona playspace and enjoy a circuit around the lake by foot or by bike. gb

Explore Bendigo's beautiful streetscapes on a Vintage Talking Tram where you can take in the city's landmarks and monuments, including Central Deborah Gold Mine, Sacred Heart Cathedral, Alexandra Fountain, Rosalind Park, the Old Post Office, Lake Weeroona and Bendigo Joss House Temple.

A round trip takes approximately an hour and is the perfect way to get your bearings and explore Bendigo's beautiful streetscapes. Tickets start from \$12.50 for adults and \$7.50 for children (3-15 years). Your Vintage Talking Tram ticket is valid all day, allowing you to hop off and wander through the city at your leisure to enjoy many attractions, shops and to dine.

Discover The Great Stupa in Myers Flat

Indulge in a little spiritual wellbeing at The Great Stupa, the world's largest Buddhist Stupa outside of Asia. The stupa is the same size and design as The Great Stupa of Gyantse in Tibet.

For as little as a donation on entry, you can wander through the Peace Park, enjoy quiet meditation, see varieties of native and exotic plants, such as the Bodhi trees, and make a wish at the wishing well. You can also see the Jade Buddha of Universal Peace, which is the largest Buddha to be carved out of gem-quality jade. The works have been produced through the City of Greater Bendigo's Create Lab small grants program, which supports local artists to test new ideas or explore new collaborations through digital media that would be suitable for a public setting like Hargreaves Mall.

Participating artists were selected through an expression of interest process, and they received small grant subsidies of up to \$4,000 to create a local-inspired theme through new artworks or projections.

Among the presenting artists were illustrator Lyn Raymer who collaborated for the first time with animator Kain White, bringing her illustrations to life. CreateA Performance Ensemble created a series of video-based vignettes to explore a new performance idea called Burnout Ballet.

Irene Holub worked with members of the local deaf community to create Auslan Poems. Paul Fletcher explores the concept of a Bendigo Symphony, combining poetic imagery and sounds from the local landscape. Annelise Henderson, Sara Hancock and Jac Hartje worked in a site-specific context in a combination of live projection and video.

City Creative Industries Officer Mandy Field said Create Lab proved to be a successful pilot project for artists to extend their creative practices in new ways.

"Create Lab allowed artists and creatives to explore, experiment and test ideas that extend the capacity, develop skills, and support new collaborations and partnerships among Greater Bendigo's creative community,"

The City would like to thank the artists' mentor David Gagliardi, who has been involved in the Create Lab project and has inspired and encouraged artists through the creative process, and project partner Emporium Creative Hub for providing meeting and studio space and hosting the Create Lab launch event. gb

MARIKIT SANTIAGO:

The Kingdom, The Power

Marikit Santiago embraces her role as a woman, daughter, migrant and mother through creativity in this stunning new exhibition at Bendigo Art Gallery.

This is the first solo exhibition in Victoria for celebrated Australian artist Marikit Santiago. The exhibition explores her Filipina-Australian identity and her complex experiences as a woman, daughter, mother and artist. Combining classical figurative painting, biblical narratives and pop cultural references, Santiago confronts personal history and universal themes with tenderness and courage.

Winner of the 2020 Sulman Prize and a three-time Archibald Prize finalist, Santiago's compelling work unearths the complex inheritances of religion, ancestry and gender, and she casts her own family in richly symbolic and dramatic scenes.

The exhibition titled *Marikit Santiago: The Kingdom, The Power* references a phrase spoken by the congregation during Catholic Mass, which praises God as creator of earth and humankind. In *The Kingdom, The Power*, Santiago considers the privileges and obligations of the 'Eden' created for her by her parents, who migrated to Australia in the 1980s and, in turn, the world she is constructing for her own children.

Santiago's figurative painting is both classical and highly contemporary. She blends luscious oil paint and gold leaf with humble found materials, such as cardboard boxes and texta. Her three young children appear not only as cherished subjects in her paintings but as her artistic collaborators, contributing ever-changing marks within Santiago's polished figuration.

Marikit Santiago lives and works on Dharug Country in Western Sydney. In 2022, Santiago held her first institutional solo exhibition at Sydney's renowned 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art, followed by solo exhibitions at Fairfield City Museum & Gallery and Museum of Art and Culture Lake Macquarie yapang in 2023.
