
Sweet Country

Inspired by real events, Sweet Country is a period western set in 1929 in the outback of the Northern Territory, Australia. When Aboriginal stockman Sam (Hamilton Morris) kills white station owner Harry March (Ewen Leslie) in self-defence, Sam and his wife Lizzie (Natassia Gorey-Furber) go on the run. They are pursued across the outback, through glorious but harsh desert country. Directed by Warwick Thornton. Released 2017. Rating MA15+.

Sweet As

Sweet As is an uplifting coming-of-age road movie by Nyul Nyul / Yawuru director Jub Clerc. With problems on the home front, 15-year-old Murra is on the verge of lashing out. That is, until her policeman uncle thwarts her self-destructive behaviour with a lifeline: a "photo-safari for at-risk kids". Murra isn't entirely convinced, but she soon joins cantankerous Kylie, uptight Sean, happy-go-lucky Elvis, and camp counsellors Fernando and Michelle on a transformative bus trip to the Pilbara. On the trail, the teens learn about fun, friendship and first crushes, as well as the forces of 'reality' that puncture the bubble of youth. Released 2022.





The Australian Dream

From shy country kid to two-time Brownlow medallist and Australian of the Year. Adam Goodes is an inspiration to many. The footy field was where he thrived; the only place where the colour of his skin was irrelevant. Goodes' world fell apart when he became the target of racial abuse during a game, which spiralled into public backlash against him. This compelling, provocative film, written by Stan Grant, uses the stunning athleticism of Goodes at the peak of his powers as well as the game itself as the film's backdrop, and prompts questions about Australia's relationship with racism and its ability to confront its own past. 
Jenna Rain Warwick on contemporary First Nations video art

Proud Luritja Woman, Jenna Rain Warwick is an emerging Artist, Curator and published Writer living and working on Wurundjeri and Boon Wurrung Country. Jenna's published work speaks to her desire to champion the creative imagination of First Nations peoples. In November 2023 Jenna undertook a residency at La Trobe Art Institute and will return for this year's film festival to introduce contemporary video art by First Nations artists.



Luku Ngärra: The Law of the Land

This documentary film is set in the Yolngu Nation of Northeast Arnhem Land and is driven by one of the country's most respected First Nations Elders, Rev Dr Djiniyini Gondarra OAM, who has been a tireless beacon for freedom and justice for his people for the last 40 years. The film will deeply challenge audiences' understanding of the Yolngu world, their history, culture and their highly sophisticated but often misrepresented Madayin System of traditional law. 
The Earth Above: A Deep Time View of Australia's Epic History

Eniov Bendiao's first showings of the The Earth Above: A Deep Time View of Australia's Epic History. This film explores Australia's past 140,000 years, incorporating traditional and scientific knowledge to tell Australia's epic story. Viewers are transported to four significant and sacred locations where histories are told by First Nations custodians. The Earth Above is a feature-length fulldome planetarium show from the Australian Research Council Centre of Excellence for Australian Biodiversity and Heritage (CABAH) produced by the Deakin MotionLab in collaboration with First Nations communities and UOW Science Space.

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The Sapphires

Inspired by a true story, four young Aboriginal women from regional Australia, who like singing country music, suddenly get the chance to change their tune and their lives. Wearing sequins and armed only with microphones they find themselves performing Motown hits to soldiers in the hell that is the Vietnam War. Against the backdrop of personal change and massive social upheaval, this is an energetic, fun and engaging play that affirms life and the realisation of dreams.

The New Boy

Set in the 1940's in South Australia, the film depicts the mesmeric story of a nine-year old Aboriginal orphan boy who arrives in the dead of night at a remote monastery run by a renegade nun. The new boy's presence disturbs the delicately-balanced world in this story of spiritual struggle and the cost of survival. Released 2023.

The Last Daughter

Brenda's first memories were of growing up in a loving white foster family, before she was suddenly taken away and returned to her Aboriginal family. Decades later, she feels disconnected from both halves of her life. But the traumas of her past do not lie quietly buried. So, she goes searching for the foster family with whom she had lost all contact. Along the way she uncovers long-buried secrets, government lies, and the possibility for deeper connections to family and culture. The Last Daughter is a documentary about Brenda's journey to unearth the truth about her past, and to reconcile the two sides of her family. Released 2022. Rating PG.





Koorie Youth Flick Fest

An annual short-film competition open to all First Nations young people from across Central Victoria who are invited to submit a short film exploring this year's theme of 'Our Generation'. The winning films will again be screened at the Film Festival's launch at the Bendigo Library. This year's Flick Fest is being supported by the City of Greater Bendigo and Bendigo-based First Nations filmmaker, Leroy Miller, of Bundadhaany Studio. A special screening of the winning films will be held at Federation Square during NAIDOC Week 2024 through the generous support of the Melbourne Arts Precinct Corporation.
