WELCOME FROM THE MAYOR

Welcome to another edition of GB Magazine.

Council is about to consider its final Budget for this Council term and I thank everyone who contributed via our Let's Talk Greater Bendigo platform and registered their top priority areas for investment. Based on your feedback, these were - Roads, bridges and drainage; Waste, recycling and resource recovery; Parks, gardens and open space; and Footpaths, tracks and trails.

Although Council spends heavily across these areas each year, your feedback has been a helpful guide to prioritise spending public money, particularly as we continue to operate in a financially constrained environment.

The Budget is based on a 2.75 per cent rate cap, as set by the Victorian Government. About 60 per cent of Budget revenue comes from rates, which helps to fund the delivery of 68 valued services.

A key challenge for Council is the gap between revenue raised and the cost of delivering services and funding new projects. The rate cap has not kept up with inflation, which means Council must carefully prioritise how it spends public money.

As a result of receiving early

community engagement and presentations to Council on projects individuals and community groups would like to see funded, Council will not release a draft Budget.

I look forward to seeing a continued investment in the priority areas, together with all other services and projects that benefit our

Sometimes unexpected events can change our Budget priorities, such as the flooding and storm events experienced at the start of the year. I want to acknowledge that recovery from such events is long and our forward planning

to lessen the impact of similar events in the future is underway.

> There has been opportunities to apply for government funding to deliver infrastructure and undertake planning. I encourage you to read CEO Andrew Cooney's column on page 11 to find out more about our long-term planning.

> > From time to time, there are certainly challenges and hard decisions that have to be made by Council, but I do believe that with careful planning, we are in a good place to manage anything unexpected.

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FROM BENDIGO AIRPORT'S NEW TERMINAL

It's just a hop, skip and a jump for anyone wanting to take flight from Bendigo Airport.

It couldn't be easier now the new terminal is complete, which features an expanded departure lounge, a new café and space for a future security screening area.

There's also a new entry foyer, baggage check-in, indoor baggage claim area and new restroom facilities. Landscaping has been delivered by Djandak, a Dja Dja Wurrung Traditional Owner business.

If you're wanting to park and fly, there's 183 parking spaces across a new asphalted car

Cr Vaughan Williams said Bendigo was only one stop from the rest of the world thanks to the Bendigo to Sydney Qantas service.

"The convenience of travelling from Bendigo Airport is second-to-none. You can check-in online, park right at the terminal, grab a coffee or toastie before you fly, and land safely in Sydney without the stress of flving out of Melbourne."

"This project has also delivered an expanded apron, which can fit two 70-seat aircraft and puts us in a great position to attract other airlines and future flights to other destinations. Nine business park lots have also been delivered and are ready to be developed by local industry.

"You could also say it's 'Bendigo to the rescue', now the airport's emergency services facilities have been bolstered and include a new helipad that can accommodate a wide array of emergency service helicopters, such as flood and fire response, as well as military and police activity.

"Thanks to the expanded apron, the airport is also a refilling site for large air tankers, one of a handful of sites in the state, and means Bendigo is a standby location during

extreme fire days. This adds to the airport's other emergency services uses, including the Air Ambulance and as a State Government fire base."

The airport redevelopment is valued at \$11.995M and has been supported by an investment of \$4.5M from the Victorian Government, \$4.5M from the Australian Government and \$2.995M from the City of Greater Bendigo. Additionally, a separate grant of \$300,000 from the Australian Government's Regional Airports Program facilitated the delivery of a new helipad and fuel truck parking bay. gb

The plane's bigger than you think

Qantas operates a Q200, 36-seat and a Q300, 50-seat turbo prop between Bendigo and Sydney*. The flight is comfortable, and the seating arrangement is two and two, so two seats, an aisle down the middle, then two more seats. The flight time is just over 2 hours. If you're off to sight-see in Sydney, then you can hop on the train at Sydney Airport and be in the city centre or by the harbour in no time.

Where to next?

The City has recently undertaken some market research to find out where people want to fly to. Top destinations included the Gold Coast, Adelaide, Brisbane and the Sunshine Coast. Discussions are ongoing with airlines to identify opportunities to establish new flights out of Bendigo.

"Paris is without doubt one of the world's most picturesque and captivating cities, and the exhibition distils its beauty and energy, including the busy banks of the Seine, bustling marketplaces, grand boulevards, idyllic public gardens and the bohemian Montmartre area as they were portrayed by some of the most influential artists and artisans of the period. This is a rare opportunity for audiences to promenade through turn-of-the-century Paris, a dynamic time when the city courted the attention of the world," Ms Bridgfoot said.

Valérie Guillaume, Director of the Musée Carnavalet, said the exhibition was an invitation for visitors to explore the role this leading tourist destination has played in influencing global design and architecture.

"The Musée Carnavalet tells the story of Paris and the Parisian," Ms Guillaume said.

"The Eiffel Tower is the city's symbol. Since 1991, the banks of its river, the Seine, have been listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Unfolding across the banks is a succession of architectural masterpieces from the Middle Ages to the present day. Some buildings, such as the Notre-Dame Cathedral, became a reference for the spread of Gothic architecture, while the Place de la Concorde or the perspective of the Invalides have influenced the town planning of many European capitals."

City seeks government support for flood resilience

The combined impact of the flood and storm events Greater Bendigo experienced at the start of the year have caused significant and widespread damage.

The repair bill to fix public infrastructure is estimated at \$15M and the recovery process will be long.

To help increase our flood resilience for the future, the City of Greater Bendigo has applied to the Federal Government's Disaster Ready Fund to support four key projects - Huntly drainage analysis and flood mitigation action plan; Minor drainage and culvert improvement program across the municipality, including debris removal in waterways; Waterway Flood Mitigation Management Plans for waterways in Epsom, Huntly, Junortoun and Heathcote; and a Goornong Flood Study.

The outcome of our applications will likely not be known until later this year but work on some of these projects may progress in some form, such as removing debris in waterways around culverts and bridges, minor culvert improvements and table drain clearing along roadsides.

We would be targeting McIvor Creek in Heathcote, Back Creek in the Epsom/Ascot/

Huntly areas, Splitters Creek in Junortoun, Bendigo Creek north of Howard Street, Epsom, and Racecourse Creek, Epsom.

While the City is only responsible and able to conduct maintenance works within 10m either side of infrastructure like bridges and culverts, we will have discussions with relevant waterway and land managers about clearing debris outside of these areas where this will make a difference to mitigating future flood risk.

The City has also engaged a contractor to undertake a comprehensive audit of the road and drainage network to identify damage that is claimable through the State and Federal governments' co-funded Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) program.

This assessment is now complete and has identified more than 5,700 defects, ranging from small-scale culvert clearing through to full reconstruction of sections of sealed and unsealed roads in various pockets.

Under the DRFA program, the City has two years to deliver this work and have the costs covered. We are currently prioritising and programming these works.

Approximately 80 per cent of the rural road network has some form of damage to it. In some areas, residents

may see works have been undertaken but sites are not fully fixed yet. We will be returning to these areas in time to fix them properly.

Flood recovery across Greater Bendigo

It has been a challenging start to 2024 for residents across Greater Bendigo.

From late December 2023 through to February 2024, the region experienced torrential rain three times in two weeks, as well as hail, resulting in flooding across many suburbs and small towns. There were also severe storms that wreaked havoc and caused widespread power outages.

When we take in the October 2022 floods as well, there have been a number of people affected by flooding several times

How we're making it easier to get around

Greater Bendigo

by bike or on foot



For many years now, the City of Greater Bendigo has been strategically working to plan, develop and deliver a network of interconnected, shared walking and cycling pathways to help people move around safely.

The City already has approximately 118.5 kilometres of pathways in its protected walking and cycling network, with more to come in the future to create a fully connected and accessible network located within 500 metres of 90 per cent of houses in urban Bendigo.


A fully connected network will assist people to safely get where they need to go in their

everyday lives by bike or on foot to places like school, work, shopping, community facilities, to visit friends and family, or simply for some exercise.

In 2019, Council adopted a Walk, Cycle Greater Bendigo Strategy. As part of the development of the strategy, the City undertook extensive consultation with the community.

Through this consultation we heard from hundreds of residents and community organisations who said they wanted an interconnected network of footpaths, shared paths, off-road trails and paths, quiet neighbourhood streets and protected cycleways across the city. Ultimately, they told us they wanted to feel safe while walking and riding a bike for travel and recreation.

Taking this feedback into account, the strategy details a number of priority future projects to grow the network and fill in the parts that are currently missing by building new sections of paths to provide for users, especially at road crossings that are often difficult to cross, while at the same time continuing to improve the existing network.



Future priority projects were selected because they will provide great connections to schools, places of employment and community facilities. They will also serve and benefit a large portion of the population and provide improved health benefits for many people.

However, all of the priority projects will require a significant investment from the City and other funding partners, including the Victorian and Australian governments, to deliver.



NEW REST STOP FOR O'KEEFE RAIL TRAIL

A new rest stop along the O'Keefe Rail Trail near the entrance to Peppercorn Park Reserve, off Longlea Lane, should prove popular for trail users when it is completed in mid-June.



Eppalock Ward Councillor Matthew Evans said construction of the \$285,000 project is underway to provide new rest stop facilities and improve safety and accessibility for users of the O'Keefe Rail Trail.

"The project will include construction of two unisex toilet facilities, a new car parking area for up to 16 vehicles, installation of a shelter with picnic tables, five new bike hoops and improvements to the entrance of Peppercorn Park," Cr Evans said.

"The creation of a new car park off the road will mean that users will no longer have to park along the narrow shoulder of Longlea Lane to unload their bikes.

"This is something that created a potential conflict with road users as the road has a 100km speed limit, so it will be safer for trail users.

"The O'Keefe Rail Trail is used for horse-riding, cycling and walking, and the project is being undertaken to improve the experience for all users of the trail.

"Cycling and walking numbers have grown rapidly over the last two years and the new toilets and shelter will provide essential facilities for all trail users.

"The new rest stop will also provide more opportunities to start and finish at different points of the trail for new experiences and distances."

The project is funded by the City of Greater Bendigo and is expected to be completed in mid-June. **gb**



Lar Birpa - a new name for athletics complex

The former La Trobe University Bendigo Athletics Complex has been renamed Lar Birpa Athletics Complex.

Lar Birpa means a place to run in the language of the Dja Dja Wurrung.

The naming of existing and new City-owned facilities in Traditional Owner language is in line with the City's Reconciliation Plan Barpangu 2021-2025 and its strong commitment to support Aboriginal place naming and the use of Traditional Owner language in public spaces across the municipality.

The name change was needed following the City's 2020 acquisition of the athletics complex on Retreat Road, Flora Hill from La Trobe University.

Registering place names not only protects our community by assisting emergency services, it also reduces confusion for transport and mail services.

Late last year Geographic Names Victoria confirmed that the proposed name met the statutory requirements for Naming Rules for Places in Victoria, and the name Lar Birpa Athletics Complex was gazetted in the Victorian Government Gazette on January 11, 2024.



FOUR FUN FACTS FROM THE PAST!

Sandhurst was proclaimed a town in 1861, a city in 1871 and in 1891 its name was changed to Bendigo.

The first saleyards opened in Charleston Road, Bendigo in 1861. The saleyards remained in operation until the City of Greater Bendigo constructed and opened the Bendigo Livestock Exchange in Wallenjoe Road, Huntly in 1997.





In 1881 the Alexandra Fountain, named after the then Princess of Wales (whose husband became King Edward VII), was officially opened by her two eldest sons Princes Albert and George (later to become King George V).

Lake Weeroona is a man-made water body that was officially opened on October 22, 1879.

Not only is dumped rubbish illegal, it is unacceptable, and we all need to reinforce this as a community.


If someone has the means to deliberately drive somewhere to dump rubbish, then they have the ability to go to a local transfer station.

E-waste, soft plastics, textiles, polystyrene packaging, fridges, freezers, air conditioners and much more can be taken for free to one of the City's transfer stations located in Strathfieldsaye, Heathcote, Goornong or the Bendigo Recycle Shop located at the entrance to the Eaglehawk Landfill (please note that whitegoods are not accepted at the Goornong Transfer Station).

All items are sorted at the transfer stations. Some items are sold at the resale shop, while others are sent off for reuse or to be recycled and made into new products.

We are all responsible for the waste we produce and there are ways to dispose of most items responsibly and repurpose unwanted materials.

It's very important to not only consider this generation but future generations too, and we thank everyone for doing the right thing with their waste in the future.

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A slate of roof upgrades for The Capital

Work is nearing completion on a staged renewal of The Capital's historic slate roof.

The Capital is one of the City's iconic and much-loved heritage buildings and the roof renewal will help to preserve it into the

Part of the City's heritage renewal program, the project has involved the removal and replacement of damaged slate with new Welsh slate to match the original, and the replacement of all associated ridge capping, box gutters, eaves gutters, valleys and flashings.

The second stage was undertaken in 2020 over the theatre's stage area and the third and final stage is the remainder of the roof, which is expected to be complete by late June.

The Capital (formerly the Masonic Hall) was designed by noted local architects William Vahland and Robert Getzschmann in a Renaissance Revival style and constructed in 1873/1874.

The building originally contained lodge

in Victoria. It is of both architectural and historical significance to the State of Victoria and is listed on both the Victorian and National Heritage Registers.



BARC - we're here to help

As the Bendigo Animal Relief Centre (BARC) approaches its fifth birthday, we want to remind the community of our purpose and how BARC can assist you with your pet.

BARC offers a free microchipping service for cats and dogs who live in Bendigo. Microchipping provides your pet with the best chance of coming home if they are lost, and we want to see as many pets as possible reunited with their owners.

We also offer free registration for all pets under 12 months of age and all pets adopted from BARC. If your pet is over 12 months we can still assist with registration, from scanning your pet for microchip information, checking its desexing status or by helping to fill out the paperwork.

BARC also offers discount cat desexing opportunities, with two schemes available to residents. Owners with a concession card can get their cat desexed for a reduced fee by applying though the National Desexing Network, and owners who are taking care of a community cat can apply for a place in the BARC Bendigo Community Cat Program, which



offers desexing, vaccination, microchipping and registration from as little as \$20.

BARC can also provide you with assistance if your pet requires behaviour and training help, or you are considering the need to rehome your pet. There may be options to explore before you surrender your pet to a shelter, and we can help you navigate these options to provide you and your pet with the best possible outcome.

BARC operates as the City's pound service, caring for lost dogs and cats until they are reunited with their owners or assessed for adoption.

Occasionally, BARC has other animals available for adoption including rabbits, guinea pigs, pet birds or chickens. The best way to see what's available for adoption and to obtain more information on services, is by visiting

All dogs and cats made available for adoption are vet checked, desexed, microchipped, vaccinated and treated for parasites. Each pet comes with a seven-day health guarantee, as well as 30 days post-adoption behaviour and training support from Petcademy.





Are you prepared for 24-hour cat containment coming this July?

With the new 24-hour cat containment rules set to commence in Greater Bendigo on July 1, it's time to start thinking about ways your cats can still enjoy the great outdoors but from the comfort of your own property.

For many years now there has been an order in place in Greater Bendigo that requires cats to be securely confined to their owner's property from sunset to sunrise. However, this is set to change to 24 hours per day confinement to property from July 2024 following the adoption of the City's Domestic Animals Act S25 and S26 Orders.

The City understands this is a significant change for cats and their owners, but there are also many benefits. Containing your cat to your property reduces the risk of cats suffering traumatic injuries from cars and other animals, contracting common cat diseases such as cat flu, ringworm and Feline Immunodeficiency Virus, being accidentally poisoned by toxic plants and pesticides, being bitten by snakes or spiders, getting lost or being exposed to extreme weather.

Cats love to move around and keep watch over their territory. They need a warm, dry bed and somewhere to laze in the sun. By building your own cat enclosure you can tailor it exactly to the needs of your cat. Cats love the variety that this system of enclosure provides, especially if it is linked to the family home through a cat door.

There is some great information available about cat-proof fencing, cat enclosures that are attached to an existing structure, the house, veranda or a shed, or free-standing cat enclosures available from the Animal Welfare Victoria website at www.agriculture. vic.gov.au/livestock-and-animals/animalwelfare-victoria/cats/enclosures-and-fencing


There is also a range of both budget and higher-end enclosure products available from local pet stores and hardware shops.

Cat enclosures, netting and cat-proof fencing are some ways to stop a cat from wandering outside your property. But remember, your cats can still go outside, as long as they remain on your property, just like dogs. Cats can leave your property in a cat carrier on a leash or in a cat pram - as long as you have effective control of them in a securely fitted harness.

From Mozambique to Bendigo, resident Karson Opincai relished the opportunity to complete a university student placement with the City of Greater Bendigo's Environmental Health unit.

Karson and his family settled in Bendigo in June 2015, when his wife began a Masters Degree at La Trobe University.

Karson had already established himself as an Agriculture Manager with an

Agricultural Engineering degree under his belt from Eduardo Mondlane University in Mozambique, but he was keen to pursue further qualifications in Australia.

He began a Postgraduate Diploma in Environmental Health in Practice online at Flinders University and was seeking a practical student work placement as part of a requirement of his postgraduate qualification.

"With my family settled in Bendigo, I was delighted to see the opportunity for a university student placement was offered with the City's Environmental Health unit," Mr Opincai said.

"I was lucky to get the three-month placement. I have gained knowledge and experience, and it has been fantastic to

accompany senior staff out in the field, visiting businesses for food inspections and going on site for septic tank permits and noise complaints.

"The work placement was very fulfilling as I was also given a special project. It was good to gain a better understanding of working with environmental health policies in the real world, which complemented my postgraduate studies.

"It also confirmed that I had transferable skills from my working life in Mozambique. The experience at the City has turned out to be much more than I expected. The team in Environmental Health has been very welcoming and even though I was on a student placement, I was treated as an equal in the team which demonstrated the great working culture for staff at the City."

City Coordinator Environmental Health Varinder Sapehiyia said the university work placement was a perfect opportunity to support new talent coming through tertiary

"The City's Environmental Health unit is keen to support university student placements and work closely with universities to build rapport in the environmental health network. I really like mentoring and recognise its importance in nurturing new talent to be the best they can be. We have a significant skills shortage in environmental health across Australia and this is a positive step for the industry as it faces these ongoing challenges," Mr Sapehiyia said.

"It is a win-win to give students exposure to environmental health in the real world and to complete their studies with comprehensive learnings from an established student placement. We ensured Karson was given support and guidance during his placement with us. He was also given the opportunity to pursue and complete an important project that benefited his postgraduate studies but was also integral to the team's activities.

"During his time, Karson was able to experience theory in practice. This was an invaluable experience, as Environmental Health Officers develop, regulate, educate, enforce, and monitor laws and regulations governing public health to promote good health, hygiene and environmental practices to keep the community safe.



"Karson was able to bring a new perspective and fresh ideas, experience, up-to-theminute training and provide new insights on contemporary techniques being taught in university. It is great for the team to have someone on placement who can

contribute to our commitment to continuous improvement."

Karson received a distinction in his postgraduate studies and is excited to pursue a career in environmental health in the future. gb

What do Environmental Officers and Technicians do at the City?

The City's Environmental Health Officers are involved in a wide range of roles to ensure high standards in public health for the community.

The roles are diverse, from inspecting food premises and waste water systems to environmental issues such as pest control, unreasonable noise, mosquitoes and air quality monitoring.

They also deal with local accommodation businesses and beauty, hair and skin penetration businesses (such as tattoo outlets), which are inspected and registered to ensure public health and safety. It's a multi-skilled job with a focus on customer service and community education. Officers work closely with businesses to help them comply with permit and environmental regulations, enforce the law and assist operators, and protect, promote and improve public health.



Is your property causing a hazard for others?

Branches and bushes that hang over front fences and cars parked across footpaths can prove a dangerous obstacle for people walking along the streets of Greater Bendigo.

Going for a walk is important for many people, so it's important that they are able to do so without having to contend with any obstacles blocking local footpaths.

Making Greater Bendigo safer is everybody's responsibility as injuries caused by overhanging branches and plants can carry a high financial and personal cost for people in our community, especially older people and those using mobility scooters, wheelchairs and walking aids.

Residents who own or occupy properties within the municipality are responsible for ensuring that they keep the growth of trees and plants contained within their property, so they do not become an obstacle on the footpath.

The City of Greater Bendigo advises residents to check their property boundaries to ensure their trees and plants are not causing a hazard, and to cut them back if they are.

Residents with concerns about obstructions on footpaths or roadways should report it to the City by phoning 1300 002 642. **gb**



Free accessible parking available for permit holders

Holders of an Accessible Parking Permit (formerly Disabled Parking Permit) can now park for free in any of the City's signed, on-street accessible parking bays.

Manager Safe Environments Jock Schofield said this meant permit holders would no longer be required to pay a parking fee when parking in a signed accessible parking bay but time limits would still apply.

"In addition, Accessible Parking Permit holders can park for double the time limit in the City's regular metered, on-street parking bays but will still need to pay for their stay up to the maximum fee," Mr Schofield said.

"For example, if a person with a current Accessible Parking Permit parks in a regular bay in a 30 minute zone, they can park for 60 minutes for the cost of parking for 30 minutes.

"The City is committed to making life easier for residents who often find it difficult getting around Greater Bendigo. This is just one simple way we can do this.'

Victoria has now transitioned to the new Accessible Parking Permit (APP) Scheme and online administration system. An Accessible Parking Permit gives parking concession to people who have been assessed by a medical practitioner or occupational therapist as having significant physical, cognitive, behavioural or neurological impairment that impacts on their mobility.

Have you discovered the PayStay app?

PayStay allows users to pay for their parking online or via a smartphone app, and is available throughout the city centre (excluding Edward Street and Hargreaves Street multi-storey car parks).

The City of Greater Bendigo is keen to continue to provide the community with a more flexible and convenient parking payment system and PayStay allows motorists to park without having to pay at a meter.

People don't carry or use cash as much as they did in the past, and many prefer the convenience of paying by card.

Users of the PayStay system can register multiple vehicles to one account and for a small reminder service fee, people can opt to have SMS reminders sent to remind them when their parking session is due to expire.

PayStay also has SMS and phone payment options and accepts Mastercard and Visa. However, people can still pay at the meters using cash or their credit or debit cards.

The PayStay app is available to download from the App Store or Google Play.

This year in October, most Victorians will vote in Local Government elections to elect a new Council to serve for the next four years.

A council's role is to lead, govern and make decisions for the benefit of all residents and ratepayers.

Following a review of electoral boundaries by the Victorian Government, the City of Greater Bendigo ward structure will change for the 2024 elections. Instead of there being three wards and three councillors in each ward, Greater Bendigo will be divided into nine wards and there will be one councillor in each ward.

It is really important a Council is representative of the community it serves, so the City is encouraging people from a variety of backgrounds to put up their hand and help make a difference.

There is a range of support available to help make serving as a Councillor easier, including reimbursement for childcare, vehicle access to attend community events, financial support for training, reimbursement for travel expenses, laptops and mobile phones are provided, and there is support for people with a disability.

Director Corporate Performance Jessica Howard said it was important potential candidates consider the bigger picture when standing for Council.

"The role of a Councillor is greater than just one issue or wanting to represent the interests of only one community. An effective Councillor needs to have broad interests and consider a range of information when making decisions," Ms Howard said.

"Being a Councillor can be likened to having a part time job and can be balanced with other responsibilities like family, community work or paid work, while the role of the Mayor is a greater time commitment, more like a full-time job.

All candidates nominating for election must complete Local Government Candidate Training before they are able to nominate.

When is the election date?

Saturday October 26. Voting will be by postal vote and the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) needs all votes received no later than 12pm, Friday November 1. Failure to vote may result in a fine.

What does Local Government do?

The City of Greater Bendigo delivers 68 services to the community, such as rubbish collection, sports facilities, childcare, immunisation, maternal and child health, major events, town planning, theatres, Bendigo Art Gallery, visitor services, parks and gardens, animal pound services, road, drainage and footpath construction, and

Local Government is not responsible for matters such as hospitals, public transport, public housing, education, major road/highway upgrades, mental health services, state and national parks, wildlife management and police.

Who has to vote?

Anyone over the age of 18 and registered on the state electoral role and council-enrolled voters such as ratepayers.

Who can be a candidate?

To be a candidate you must be an Australian citizen, aged 18 years or over, be on the voters' roll for the council you want to stand for, complete mandatory candidate training and not be previously disqualified from being a councillor. You can be a candidate for any ward.

Did you know the first recorded women's cricket match in Australia was held in Bendigo in 1874?

This special milestone in Bendigo's history has been celebrated in the inaugural exhibition *Frisky Matrons & Forward Spinsters* at the Bendigo Historical Society's History House Museum, with assistance from the City of Greater Bendigo, Cricket Victoria and the Bendigo Easter Fair Society.

In 1874, cricket and social change collided in Bendigo when a group of women challenged the values underpinning colonial society by playing a charity cricket match as part of the Bendigo Easter Fair.

Symbolising much more than just a spirited charitable act, these women players were trailblazers and faced many challenges and barriers to appear publicly playing sport.

This exhibition also launched the Bendigo Historical Society's new community museum and tells the story of 22 courageous local women, and the men who supported them in cricket-mad gold rush Bendigo.

Beautiful objects such as Easter Fair pins, cricket belt buckets and other cricket paraphernalia loaned especially for this exhibition from private collectors are on display, many for the first time. Objects from the collection of the Bendigo United

Cricket Club and the Bendigo Historical Society are also part of this unique display.

City Heritage Collections Officer Simone Ewenson worked in partnership with enthusiastic volunteers and the committee from the Bendigo Historical Society, particularly Kay MacGregor and Dennis Johanson who were heavily involved in the development and research of the exhibition.

Local families with links to the 1874 match also contributed, including the Rae and Cordner families who had four family members involved in the historic match.

Ms Ewenson said the research captured a significant moment, not only in women's history but sporting history nationally.

"Women were confronted by social norms that did not allow them to undertake physical activity. Not only did their clothing impose huge restrictions on movement, they were scorned for showing their ankles and legs and branded unfeminine if they did so," she said.

"Women in central Victoria, like women everywhere, wanted to contribute in meaningful ways to society and playing a charity cricket match was a logical way to do so."

Frisky Matrons & Forward Spinsters - where did the exhibition name come from?

The Maryborough and Dunolly Advertiser reported on April 13, 1874 a negative story about the first Ladies Cricket Match at the Bendigo Easter Fair:

"This unfeminine trail of masculine skill at Sandhurst, in which frisky matrons took part with forward spinsters, was engaged as – we are told in the cause of 'heaven born charity.' Nothing else could extort money from the pockets of the male public but this unwomanly exhibition on a public holiday."

On the other hand, the *Bendigo Advertiser* coverage was positive and celebrated the milestone match, but Melbourne newspapers were also scathing about the women's pursuit to play cricket and the underlying push for social change.

Bendigo – birthplace of women's cricket

Bendigo celebrated the 150th anniversary of the first women's cricket match in Australia, which took place at the Bendigo Easter Fair in 1874.

To mark the milestone, the QEO provided the perfect backdrop for a representative T20 match Bendigo V Ballarat with a victory for Bendigo. It was watched by many families with close connections to the 1874 match. Diane Robertson is the great granddaughter of Barbara Rae, who was the top scorer in the original game. Ms Robertson received a special bat from Cricket Australia in recognition of her great grandmother's sporting achievements. The first female cricketers were trailblazers as they faced many barriers and discrimination for wanting to play a male-only sport publicly.

Young mob stories through actions

First Nations art gallery Djaa Djuwima's latest exhibition *Young Mob Excelling* tells the stories of young First Nations people who are making their mark across a range of activities.

This is an opportunity to share, celebrate and gain insights from a young generation of First Nations people who live in or are connected to Greater Bendigo.

The exhibition brief asked people under 25 to capture a photo or an image of them doing a favourite hobby or activity, being part of a community.

The contributions are inspiring and wide-ranging from a passion, a hobby or something that is important in a young person's daily life, such as playing a favourite sport, going to school, or enjoying activities or interests.

Contributors have also provided memorabilia and a brief profile. Some have contributed an original piece of artwork for the free exhibition.

Children under eight have also contributed artwork, which is displayed in a dedicated area.

Gallery curator and Arts Officer, First Nations Janet Bromley said it was a wonderful exhibition celebrating young mob and what matters to them.

"It's not often that an exhibition is dedicated solely to young people who bring an exciting and new energy from a young perspective, not seen before in Djaa Djuwima," Ms Bromley said.

"Djaa Djuwima means 'to show, share Country' in Dja Dja Wurrung language and the gallery is a safe place for young First Nations people to explore cultural expression, identity, heritage and connection.

"It is so important for young mob in the community to see themselves represented through their peers.

"Young Mob Excelling is a great way to inspire other young First Nations people and show them that everything is possible. This is where dreams, hopes and optimism are out there for everyone to see. I hope that exhibitors will feel a sense of self-confidence and pride showing their contribution to their mob, friends and the wider community." gb

Inner Growth

Among the contributions is this beautiful piece, *Inner Growth*, from a young Yorta Yorta woman Rose Briggs.

Ms Briggs said *Inner Growth* highlighted the reciprocal relationship between First Nations people, wellbeing and the wellbeing of Country.

"We heal and grow Country, and it heals for and supports our growth, and ultimately, our survival in return. I get a lot of my inspiration from native plants, experiences and emotions" Ms Briggs said

Young Mob Excelling is open to the public from 9am to 5pm, May 10 to August 30, at Djaa Djuwima, located at the Bendigo Visitor Centre, 51-67 Pall Mall.







The successful monthly program features a live performance specially curated for children from local, national as well internationally recognised musicians and performers.

As the program name suggests, cushions are laid out on the floor and performances are no more than 40 minutes in duration. The sessions are designed to stimulate young listeners and each concert is different from the last

It's a unique experience for children, from babies to pre-schoolers, to interact and be immersed in live performances featuring music, singing and dancing from different genres and styles.

The idea from the start has been to provide a first live music experience for a very young audience in a relaxed, friendly and accessible environment that is informal, fun and low cost.

Manager Bendigo Venues & Events
Julie Amos said she was delighted the
Cushion Concert program had gone
from strength to strength.

"It is fantastic that we are celebrating the program's 10th year," Ms Amos said.

"One of the key elements of the program has been encouraging children to experience and explore a wide range of musical styles and not limit the performances to what might be deemed 'children's music and performances'.

"We know that children learn through play, and our music and movement experiences tap into this 'play state' and encourage children to respond, experiment and imagine.

"Our Cushion Concert performances have been truly embraced by young families and we've been lucky to have a loyal following, who flock to our events at our iconic venue, The Capital, each month.

"In the 10 years since it began, it has been wonderful to welcome new families and to see their children grow and enjoy the performances at all ages."

The Cushion Concert program at The Capital began with a piano performance by Millie Heinrich for 50 children and their carers.

The program has since presented more than 100 concerts, featured 700 performers and attracted more than 6,000 audience members.

Children bring a cushion (or borrow one), as well as a teddy and a snack. If they need to move around to get a better view, want to dance or stretch out on the floor, that's fine. If a child has a question or wants to talk about the performance – that's great!

Mother of three Corinne Cinatl has home-schooled all three of her children and she found the Cushions Concerts to be a great way to introduce them to musical education.

"I've always been keen for my children to have a musical culture, but I knew they wouldn't be able to sit through a three-hour concert at their young age," Corinne said.

"The Cushion Concert program is just beautiful, and the children and babies are exposed to different types of music and the power of live performances in a short burst. I like the fact that they tailor it for pre-schoolers, but the integrity of the music is not compromised or simplified to be too 'childish'.

"All three children have enjoyed Cushion Concerts in different ways. My eldest son, who is now at high school, and my youngest daughter who is three, have outgoing personalities so their natural reaction has been to jump up, dance and sing. My middle child, Matilda, is nine, and has been playing the violin for four years. She loves how musical instruments sound live compared to hearing them on TV, and seeing how the musicians 'feel'

"Cushion Concerts have become a ritual for the family and we all look forward to it. My daughters love to dress up for the occasion, packing a cushion and a teddy so they are ready for 40 mins of magic at a Cushion Concert."

As part of her role as the City of Greater Bendigo
Heritage Collections Officer, Simone Ewenson is often
called upon to assist community groups that have
fascinating heritage collections. Many of these
collections are not often seen by the public and
need preserving. Ms Ewenson recently had
the privilege of meeting and assisting a small
group of dedicated volunteers with a passion
for harness racing at Lord's Raceway in
Junortoun.

Over the past five years, volunteers Noel Ridge, Norm West and Steve Sparks have worked hard to develop the skills and knowledge required to manage and care for a collection worthy of national attention. Their dream was to create an exhibition space at Lord's Raceway for the public to enjoy.

They recognised early on in the collection's creation that digitising was an important first step in managing the collection. The volunteers were fortunate to have received a grant and hands-on

assistance from the team at Victorian Collections to begin the slow but vital task of cataloguing and photographing every item. To date around 550 items have been digitised, with more still to come: www.victoriancollections.net.au/organisations/

As the City's Heritage Collections Officer, Ms Ewenson was able to assist Noel, Norm and Steve with practical advice and encouragement to ensure the complex needs of their significant collection were met.

"There have also been challenges around how to appropriately store and present a collection that includes a diverse range of materials and size types,



including colourful but fragile racing silks and caps, rare and original photographs, a stunning trophy collection and a variety of large racing sulkies," Ms Ewenson said.

"Many of these challenges have been overcome by making the most of the professional support available to them through my role as Heritage Collections Officer and the sector more broadly."

Ms Ewenson said the project's ambitions became more pronounced with the sad passing of Noel Ridge last year.

"Noel was one of the collection's stalwarts, so it was a challenging time for the volunteers. Norm and Steve continued to work tirelessly to ensure their original vision of presenting this stunning collection to the public was fulfilled," Ms Ewenson said.

The group's passion and commitment paid dividends with a fantastic outcome for the community. The culmination of this work has resulted in the creation of a highly professional exhibition space open to the public on race days and for special events at Lord's Raceway.

"While this work is ongoing, I have been hugely impressed with their passion and dedication, and the results are a testimony to what can be achieved with a lot of arduous work and a willingness to seek assistance when needed," Ms Ewenson said.

"I look forward to working further with Norm and Steve in the coming years as they honour the memory of Noel and bring to life more of harness racing's hidden stories." gb
